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Climbing Vines

Boston Ivy (*Parthenocissus Creeper*): Self-clinging, deciduous (perennial) vine. Dark green leaves turn scarlet red in the fall. Grows in sun and shade, however full sun provides the best fall color. Growth never stops! Prune as needed to keep maintained. Makes an excellent screen.

Clematis (*Clematis hybrids*): They need a trellis or support to grow on. Deciduous (perennial) vines. Depending on the variety, blooms appear in white, red, pink, purple and bicolor, from May until frost. Clematis likes sun on the vine but shade on it's roots (actually the lower 12 inches of your clematis vine need to be shaded.) Pruning times vary per variety; some clematis bloom on old wood, some on new wood. Maximum size: 8 ft. by 6 ft.

Climbing Hydrangea (*Hydrangea anomala ssp. petiolaris*): Self-clinging, deciduous (perennial) vine. Slow to establish once planted...don't overfertilize or overwater...by the third year they will begin putting on some serious growth. Small, white, snowball-like flowers in June to early July have a good fragrance. Full to part sun. Well-drained soil is vital. Shield from strong, northwest winter winds. Peeling bark adds winter interest once foliage has dropped. Prune to keep maintained. Does an excellent job covering walls, arbors, trees, etc.

Mandevilla (*Mandevilla x amabilis*): A fabulous Annual vine. No other vine will bloom as much as Mandevilla. Uppot your newly purchased Mandevilla and place it (pot and all) in the ground where you want to train it to grow. In Mid-September, lift out of the ground and cut away all but the first 18 inches of growth. Take inside and keep as a houseplant all winter. In mid-May, place the vine outside in the ground once more. Will grow well in full sun to a half-day of sun. Up to 20 ft. by 8 ft.

Silver Lace Vine (*Polygonum aubertii*): Fast-growing, deciduous (perennial) vine. White to pinkish-white flowers cling closely together from July into September. Silver lace vine needs support to cling to...an arbor, trellis, lattice, etc. Full sun to part shade; will tolerate poor soil as long as it drains well. Contain to desired height and width.

Trumpet Vine (*Campsis radicans*): Aggressive deciduous (perennial) vine. Grows best with some sort of support. Blooms ranging in color from yellowish-orange to orange to red, depending on the variety, from June into July. Blooms on new wood, so prune back in early spring to maintain size. Prune off forming seedpods to encourage rebloom. Plant in full to half-day sun, in any soil. Makes a wonderful screen.

Virginia Creeper (*Parthenocissus quinquefolia*): Self-clinging, deciduous (perennial) vine. New growth emerges bronze to red, changing to glossy green leaves. Fall color is spectacular purplish-red. Will trail over ground, up walls and trellises. Will grow as tall and wide as its support. Will grow in sun or shade, any soil type; requires good drainage. Clusters of black berries will show through after leaves drop.

Wisteria (*Wisteria floribunda*): Deciduous (perennial) vine. Vines become woody with age and need support to climb on. Slightly fragrant white, pink or purple blooms from April into May. Blooms form in fall and are often destroyed by winter temps in Kentucky...plant in an area protected by the harsh northwest wind in winter. Chinese varieties tend to be more winter hardy. Keep size contained by pruning. Plant in sun to part shade.

Honeysuckle (*Lonicera*): Aggressive, deciduous (perennial) vine. Sweetly scented flowers in oranges and reds in Spring to summer attract hummingbirds. Train to climb a trellis or fence. Prune after flowering to maintain desired size and shape. Will reach 15 to 30 ft.

Chocolate Vine (*Akebia*): A tough, semi evergreen (perennial) vine. Great for covering ground, walls or anything else. Bright purple berries dangle in the fall; in the spring, small fragrant flowers peep out from beneath foliage. Plant in sun to shade, any soil type. Will reach 20 to 40 ft.

Variiegated Porcelain Berry Vine (*Ampelopsis*): Deciduous (perennial) vine. White and green variegated foliage. Creamy white flowers emerge in mid to late-summer. In fall, berry-like fruits mature to a porcelain blue color. With support will cover walls, fences, trellises, etc. Also makes a good groundcover if untrained. Will reach 10 to 20 ft.

*** Other vines of interest...annuals...available in Seed form only:**

Moonflower (*Ipomea alba*): A vigorous Annual vine. Scatter seeds in a sunny location in May to early June. Moonflower will grow in average soil, it does not need to be fertilized, and it should be watered only during hot, dry summers when the leaves droop. Great for concealing a rusty chain-link fence. Reaches 15 ft. by 15 ft.

Morning Glory (*Ipomea purpurea*): Rapid-growing annual vine. Like its cousin, the Moonflower, it should be planted from seed in mid-May to mid-June. This late-summer blooming vine comes in colors of blue, violet, white, pink and bicolor. Does a great job of concealing a chain-link fence. Plant in well-drained soil, in a sunny to half-sunny location. Contain to desired height and width.
